11 Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. 12 Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.

(Matthew 5:1-12, New Revised Standard Version, NRSV)

...Loose Lines from Daniel's Den...

The Gospel of Matthew chapters five through seven, contain Jesus Christ's "Sermon on the Mount". Matthew chapter five, verses one through twelve, is the part of the Sermon called, "the Beatitudes". "Beatitudes" is a Latin word that when translated into English reads, "blesseds". That is because the majority of these verses begin with the word, "Blessed".

Now, every time I read the Beatitudes, I have to stop and wonder, "How in this world is someone who is 'poor in spirit', or mournful, or meek, or persecuted, or reviled, blessed?" Even when I look at the other "blesseds" - for those who hunger and thirst for righteousness", or those who are "merciful", or "pure in heart", or "peacemakers" - people who possess those qualities aren't always blessed by their efforts. Sometimes, they fail miserably. Sometimes, others take advantage of them. Sometimes, they suffer greatly for trying to do the right thing. These "blesseds" are really some headscratchers!

After reading and scratching my head over the Beatitudes for a while, I have always found it best to think about who preached the Sermon on the Mount. Jesus Christ not only preached these words, but he also lived them. Jesus actually lived *AND* died by these words. Poor in spirit? Jesus experienced frustration when his disciples didn't understand his teachings or faltered in their faith. Mournful? Jesus experienced the deaths of his kinsman, John the Baptist and his friend Lazarus. Meek? Jesus did not threaten, coerce, or force anyone into accepting his Gospel. Hungering and thirsting for righteousness? Jesus embodied the righteousness of God. Jesus looked for righteousness everywhere he went, yet he found hypocrites and sinners everywhere. Merciful? Mercy is what Jesus offered hypocrites and sinners alike. Pure in heart? The Scriptures testify that Jesus is the Son of God and that he was without sin. Peacemaker? Yes indeed, but never at the expense of truth and justice! Persecuted and reviled? Jesus was persecuted, reviled, falsely accused, and nailed to a cross – not for *his* sake, but for *our* sake. Jesus bled and died so that we may be forgiven for our sins and have new life – everlasting life – in the kingdom of heaven.

"The kingdom of heaven"! That's when it dawns upon me. The Beatitudes aren't about when the kingdom comes on earth as it is in heaven. When we read the Beatitudes closely, we can see God's Word says, "Blessed *are*" before each one. God's Word does not say, "blessed *will be*"! God's Word is saying that when we follow Jesus we are blessed in this life, not in the sweet by and by. We are blessed no matter what this world throws at us. Even when we think we are not blessed, we are. We are blessed because we place our faith in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. We are blessed because we have a hope beyond hope. We are blessed because Jesus has defeated not only sin but also death itself. We are blessed because, while we live in this world, we are also living in the kingdom of heaven at the same time.

We can enter the kingdom of heaven today, if we are willing to take up the cross and follow Jesus. If we are willing to die to our sins and rise up with Jesus... If we are willing to die to the ways of this world and live in the ways of the kingdom of heaven – the Way of Jesus Christ... The promise Jesus makes is if we are willing to lose our life for the sake of Jesus Christ and his Gospel, then we will find our life in him (Matthew 16:21ff.).

The Beatitudes aren't Jesus' vision of the kingdom of heaven sometime in the future. The Beatitudes are a real-life reality, right now, if we trust and obey Jesus. So, let us join together to follow Jesus and live in the ways of the kingdom of heaven. Living in the ways of the kingdom of heaven will not be easy, but this world needs to see it.



Deacon's Dialogue

Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid (John 14:27).

Last month, I was able to witness the historic Walk for Peace being made from Texas to Washington, DC, by the Theraveda Buddhist Monks. The experience was something that impacted me quite a bit and got me to reflecting on peace and what it means to have true peace in our hearts. When you do a quick google search for the word “peace,” you’ll find the first few definitions include “the nonwarring condition of a nation, a group of nations or the world” and “a state of mutual harmony between people or groups, especially in personal relations” (dictionary.com). But peace is more than the absence of war. Peace is not a strained or a false harmony.

The Hebrew word *shalom* is often expressed as a greeting, but a flippant use of the word to indicate peace as just the absence of confrontation would not be fair, either. The way this word has been explained to me by one of my professors, Dr. Nina Balmaceda, is that it means “just peace,” as in completeness or wholeness. When we think about the type of peace we want to live in our individual lives, as well as in our communities, our nation, and beyond, the word peace takes on a lot more weight, responsibility and significance if we want to follow a truly biblical life of peace. And Jesus reminds us much in the scripture above found in John.

How does Jesus’ peace differ? It’s not just a peace of assured salvation. When we are justified through Christ, we don’t stop there. We must be transformed here because of that acceptance of Christ, which should show up in how we give to our neighbors, how we talk to others, how we show up for other human beings. Wholeness Christ means reconciliation between us and God through Christ but also reconciliation to each other. That means seeing the face of God in every single person we meet in person or see on a digital platform.

I think a lot of people have a lot of turmoil within themselves that prevents them not only from accepting the freely offered gift of not just salvation but peace and wholeness that Jesus Christ gives to us. And because of that, actually carrying out peace in action toward others is a struggle for them. If the type of reconciliation, love and “peace” that Jesus offered to us was easy for human beings to accomplish, he would not have emphasized the peace He offers as being different or much deeper and more profound than what the world sees as peace. In a frightened, reactive, hostile world, the type of peace Jesus practiced, preached, and purchased with His own blood is needed more than ever, but we will never be able to understand or implement a fraction of true peace without Him.

This February, what many call the “Month of Love,” pray sincerely for God to help you abide so deeply in His peace that it transforms your heart in such a way that you can’t help but want the same for others and practice the same toward others.
